## Executive Summary

In 2012, Parks & Trails New York launched the Erie Canalway Trail End-to-End program with support from the New York State Canal Corporation. To encourage participation, the program was promoted in PTNY communications and social media.

To date, there are 930 End-to-End program registrants, 72 persons (8%) registered using the online form on the PTNY website. The names of others were entered by PTNY from the roster of riders of the 2011 and 2012 *Cycling the Erie Canal* bike tour (CTEC). Only 16 of the 72 persons who registered online were not part of the *Cycling the Erie Canal* bike tour.

The End-to-End program provides registrants with inclusion in the End-to-End Honor Roll on PTNY's website, individual certificates of recognition and an Erie Canalway Trail End-to-End decal. As the application form includes multiple questions about the End-to-End and their journey, the program also helps to define the individuals who choose to experience all 361 miles of the Erie Canalway Trail. Efforts are also underway to better match the CTEC rider and End-to-End survey questions to capture similar data even if an End-to-End enters the roll solely by being a CTEC participant.

Most of the 930 persons presently registered for the End-to-End program reside in the United States. Forty-six (46) percent live in New York State while an additional 18% live in a state or Canadian provinces that border New York. The End-to-Enders range in age from six to 88, with an average age of 51 and a median age of 55. All completed the trip by bike.

Word of mouth was the way that 31% of the End-to-Enders first heard about the Erie Canalway Trail or CTEC. The next most popular communication channel was the PTNY website with 18%.

The 43 persons who registered for End-to-End status on their own rather than being entered by PTNY reported spending between \$10 and \$225 per day. Thirty-six (36) % reported spending \$50 to \$99 per day and 32% spent \$100 to \$149 per day.

Of the 16 persons who completed the trail separate from CTEC, more than half spent at least seven nights on the trail, primarily staying in hotels and bed and breakfasts.

When asked what they enjoyed most about the trip, End-to-Enders commented on the charming small towns, beautiful countryside, history, and the feeling of accomplishment. One rider commented, "Many people believe they have to travel out of New York to find natural beauty. I was one of those people until I went on this trail. It was difficult, but it was very life-changing and completely changed my views around of New York. This state is a state of beauty and the people along the way were fantastic."

Better signage, more paved trail, and completion of existing gaps were the most often cited suggestions for improvement.

Because most of the End-to-Enders were CTEC participants, data on month the trip was completed, mode of travel, number of nights spent on the trail and type of lodging used are skewed to the

characteristics of that one event. As the End-to-End program continues a fuller picture will emerge of the non-CTEC participant.

## **I. Background on the End-to-End program**

It is not known how many individuals traverse the entire length of the 361-mile Canalway Trail each year or complete the full mileage over several years, but at a minimum, each summer more than 500 cyclists take part in the *Cycling the Erie Canal* bicycle tour riding from Buffalo to Albany. In order to recognize persons completing the full mileage of the Erie Canalway Trail from Buffalo to Albany, Parks & Trails New York (PTNY), the New York State Canal Corporation, and the Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor decided to establish an Erie Canalway Trail End-to-End program.

In 2012, Parks & Trails New York launched the Erie Canalway Trail End-to-End program with support from the NYS Canal Corporation. PTNY developed a End-to-End Honor Roll, a certificate of recognition and an Erie Canalway Trail End-to-End decal; designed an online registration system; and promoted the program in various publications.

## **II. Registration**

Parks & Trails New York added a new section to its website to describe the End-to-End program and offer a portal through which Erie Canalway Trail visitors can register to be recognized as an Erie Canalway Trail End-to-End. The program was also promoted on the “Planning a Journey” section of the PTNY website. These web pages are attached to the report as Appendix A.

To date, the End-to-End program has generated 930 registrants. Seventy-two of the registrants (8%) used the online registration form. The remaining registrants were entered into the system from the roster of riders of the 2011 and 2012 *Cycling the Erie Canal* bike tour (CTEC). The registrations for these tours were combined, and then those riders that participated for a weekend only or as a driver were excluded from the final list that was added to the End-to-End Honor Roll.

### **A. PDF Registration**

PTNY first developed the registration form using Adobe Acrobat 9 Pro’s form builder. Not only was it laborious to create a registration form using this program, it also required considerable time for processing.

### **Process of registration**

1. Applicant filled out the online PDF form (Appendix B).

Upon completion they could either:

- a. Print and mail the form to PTNY (no registrant elected to use this method, assumedly because if they had the capability to access and fill out the form they could send it in electronically)
- b. Submit the form electronically via email

2. Adobe converted the data in the form into an .xml file, a data file. This file was automatically attached to an email and then sent to an email address established by PTNY: [EndtoEnd@ptny.org](mailto:EndtoEnd@ptny.org). This address was assigned to an administrative staff person who checked for and processed registrations.
3. This .xml file was saved individually, and then copied, manually, into an Excel spreadsheet.
4. The administrator sent an email to the applicant confirming their registration (Appendix C).
5. From this database, the program administrator ran a mail merge to create a certificate of recognition (Appendix D) and produce an envelope to mail the certificate and End-to-End decal (Appendix E).
6. The program administrator then added the applicant's name to the Honor Roll (Appendix F) and posted the Honor Roll to the website.

### **Results of the PDF registration process**

To kick off the 2012 Cycling Season, PTNY launched the End-to-End registration program in June. Fifty eight (58) people took advantage of the PDF form registration process until it was revamped in November of 2012 because the PDF form process had the following limitations:

1. It did not automatically populate a database.
2. It did not confirm receipt of successful registration.
3. It could not produce mail-merge documents on its own.
4. The PDF forms could not always be relied upon to capture and transmit data.
5. The program administrator needed to commit a great deal of time and energy performing menial tasks associated with registration processing (Instructions are included as Appendix G).

After a long process to identify a simple, affordable, and user friendly solution, PTNY settled on WuFoo.com, a low-cost online form-builder that had much more to offer than the PDF form.

### **B. WuFoo Registration**

PTNY easily migrated the registration form questions into WuFoo. A few questions were added to the form and others were tweaked to better capture data from the applicant. This resulted in a smoother registration process and provided the applicant with instant feedback.

### **Process of registration**

1. An applicant fills out the online form (Appendix H).
2. Upon completion of the form, the applicant clicks "Submit."
3. The applicant is taken to a confirmation page (Appendix I) with a link to the certificate of recognition. Applicants can then open and print the certificate themselves. To date we have not found a way to populate the certificate with data collected in WuFoo and produce the product within the internet browser.
4. The user-supplied data that is collected is automatically inserted into a database managed by WuFoo.

5. This database, accessible by any one from any work station, can be downloaded and added to the master Excel database. From the master database the program administrator can produce an envelope to mail the decal.

### **Benefits of WuFoo**

Wufoo provides analysis of the registration process. PTNY is able to see the referrer from which registrants accessed the form (Constant Contact, for example), where the users are from (top cities), what browser (Explorer) and platform (Windows) the registrant is working from. We can also see how many people start the form and finish it, how long it takes to complete, and what percent of users encounter an error (a missed question or unacceptable value). A sample of how this analysis data would look for the End-to-End program is provided in Appendix J. When we migrated our questionnaire to WuFoo we took the opportunity to tweak some questions and add others. The administration of the WuFoo registration process is much more manageable (Appendix K).

To date, no one has registered through the Wufoo form. We believe this is due to the fact we migrated to WuFoo only recently, and winter is not the season that people are thinking about their summer vacations. We also heavily promoted End-to-End over the course of the spring, summer and fall, and we believe we may have reached all the potential registrants we could before the season ended.

### **III. Promotion**

PTNY promoted the End-to-End program in a variety of ways:

- “Above the fold” feature of the PTNY homepage [www.ptny.org](http://www.ptny.org) for the spring, summer, and fall
- In the June 2012 and October 2012 issues of Parks & Trails Enews (11,400 readers) (Appendix L), winter 2011-2012 edition of PTNY’s semi-annual newsletter, *Greenspace* (11,400 distribution) (Appendix M), *Canalway Trail Times* summer ’12 and winter ’12 Newsletters (Appendix N) (1,500 distribution), and the electronic newsletter produced by the Western Erie Canal Alliance.
- On PTNY’s Facebook page and Twitter.
- In the letter from PTNY that accompanies all *Cycling the Erie Canal* guidebook purchases . The letter promotes the program and invites the buyer to apply if and when they complete a ride of the entire Erie Canalway Trail. (Appendix O)

### **IV. Analysis of the End-to-End Program Registrants**

The online registration form generates a significant amount of data that is not collected from the bike tour registration form, thus we obtain more complete information from those who register online as End-to-Enders than from bike tour participants whose names we enter into the End-to-End roster. Also, all information from non-bike tour End-to-End applicants is self-reported, while some of the data from bike tour participants, registered by PTNY, is inferred.

For example, the End-to-End program registrants must select “bike” for mode of travel. Because a bicycle is required for the CTEC tour, it is inferred that all the End-to-End registrants from the tour used a bike for the mode of travel. The same assumptions applied for the questions “was your trip part of the CTEC ride?” and number of nights on the canal.

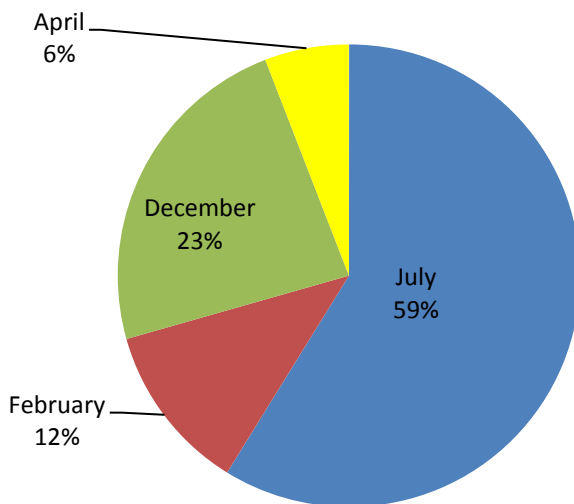
We’re investigating how to add additional questions to the bike tour registration form and/or how to combine the results of the end-of-tour survey of CTEC participants to get a more complete, cohesive picture of these individuals that we enter onto the roll. We are also looking into how best to synthesize questions on the CTEC survey so the results match up with the results of the End-to-End survey.

#### **A. About the 930 End-to-Enders**

At the end of 2012, 930 persons are included on the roster of Erie Canalway Trail End-to-Enders. Of the 930 in the program, 72 people filled out the online registration form. The remainder of applicants were added to the roll after they completed PTNY’s 2011 or 2012 *Cycling the Erie Canal* (CTEC) bicycle tour. Sixteen of all 930 End-to-End applicants completed the ride on their own, not part of the CTEC tour.

The 914 persons that completed their End-to-End journey as part of PTNY’s annual CTEC ride did so in July. Most of the 16 End-to-Enders that did not participate in the CTEC tour also completed their journey in July.

### **Month of tour completion**



July was not a surprise for the most common month to complete the journey. The percentage of applicants that report completing the journey in the winter (35% of applicants) was surprising. Perhaps applicants believed that “date completed your tour” meant “date you’re applying to become an End-to-End.” We’ve since arranged the questions in the registration form to help illustrate that we’re looking for the date they completed the tour, not the date of applying for the End-to-End recognition.



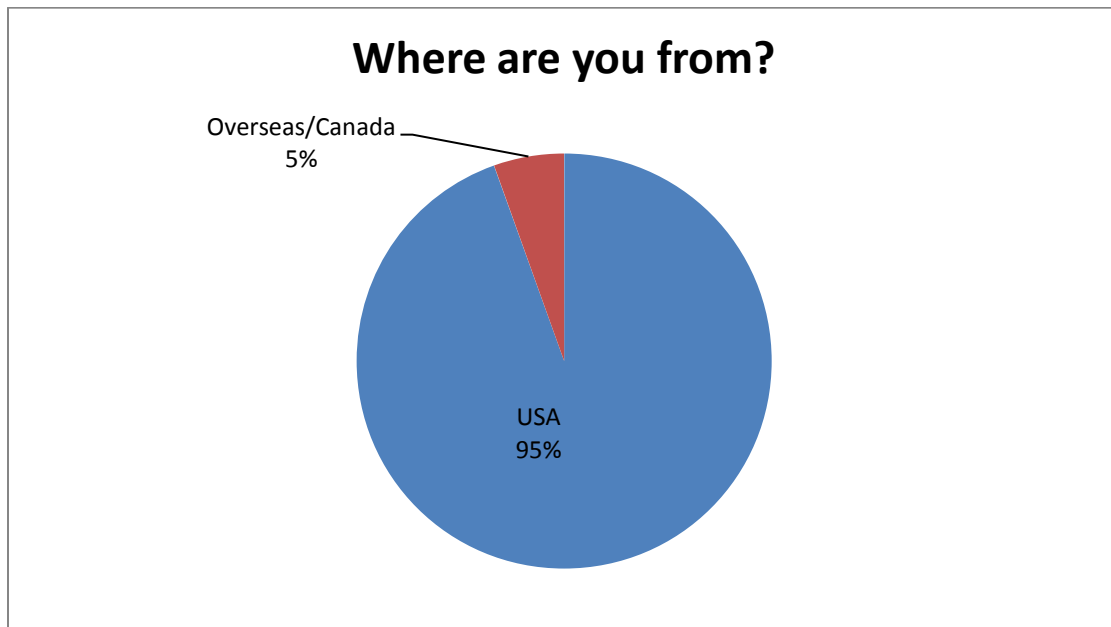
For applicants that report having completed the trail as part of CTEC, we ask if they participated in CTEC multiple times. If they answer “no” they are asked to write the year of their tour. If they answer “yes,” they can check boxes to indicate which years they joined the tour. Five applicants reported riding the entire length of the Canalway Trail more than once as part of CTEC.

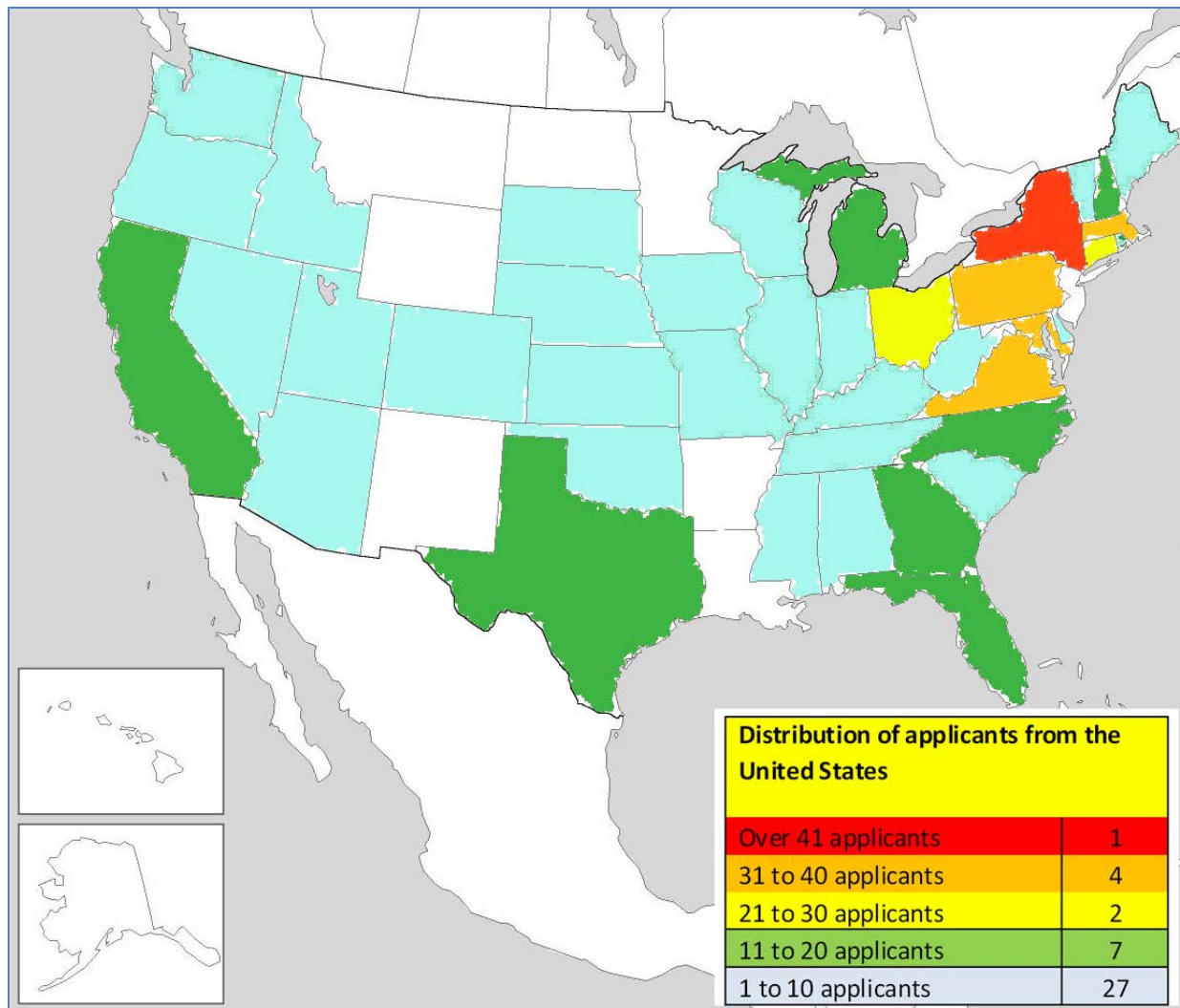
***Where are they from?***

Most of the End-to Enders were from 41 states and the US territory of Puerto Rico. New York represents 46% of all the registrants while 18% came from states or Canadian provinces that border New York.

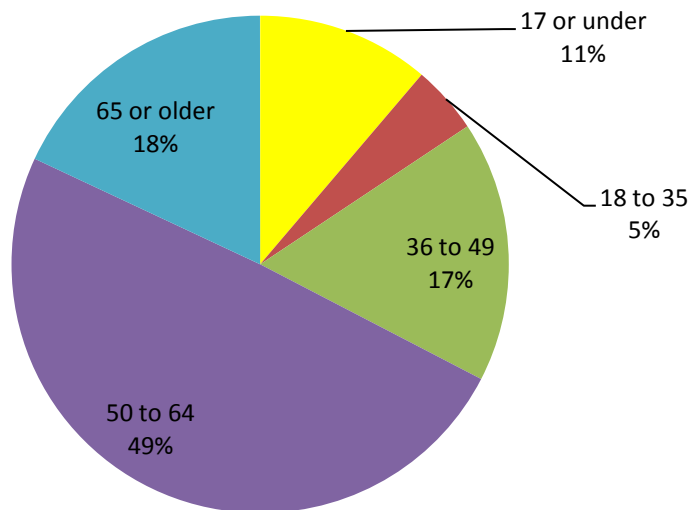


### ***How old they?***

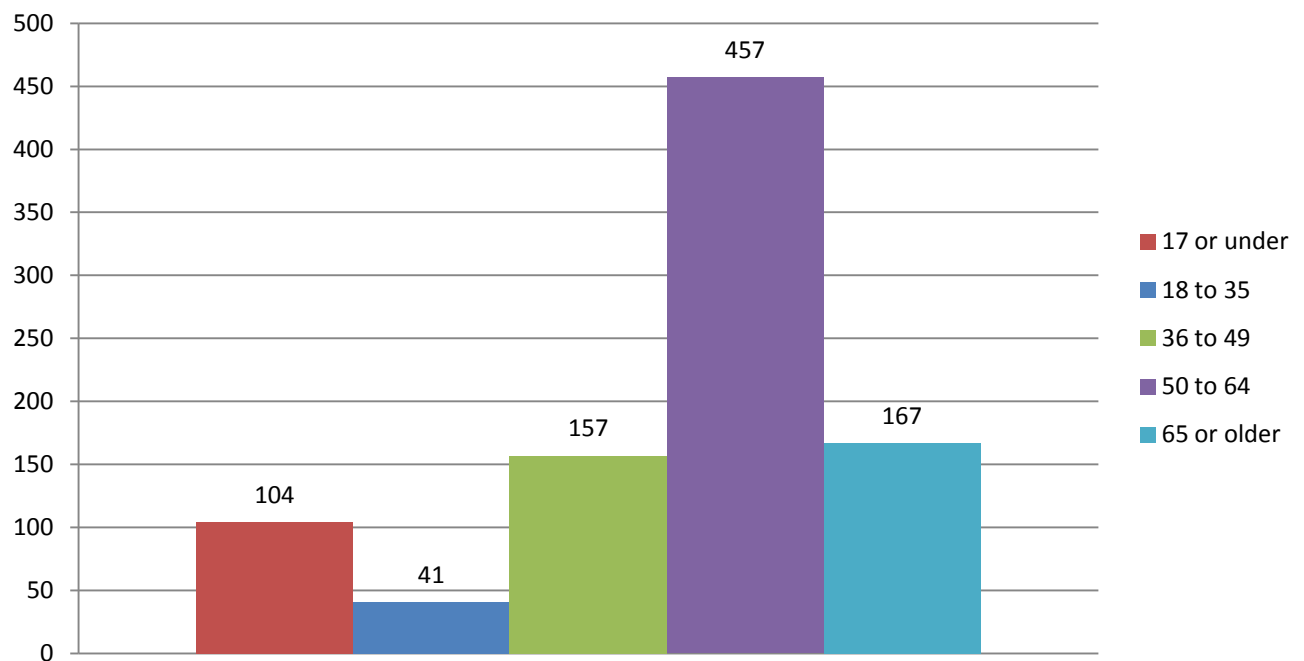
The youngest End-to-Ender registered was six year old. The oldest was 88. The average age was 51 and the median age was 55.

The bike tour registration form and the End-to-End registration form do not have compatible questions. The bike tour registration form asks for an exact age, the PDF form had asked for a range. This question was modified on the WuFoo form so that going forward; the questions will yield compatible answers.

This question was added to the WuFoo form after we used it for the Erie Canalway Trail economic impact survey. It does not appear on the PDF form, thus there are no responses.

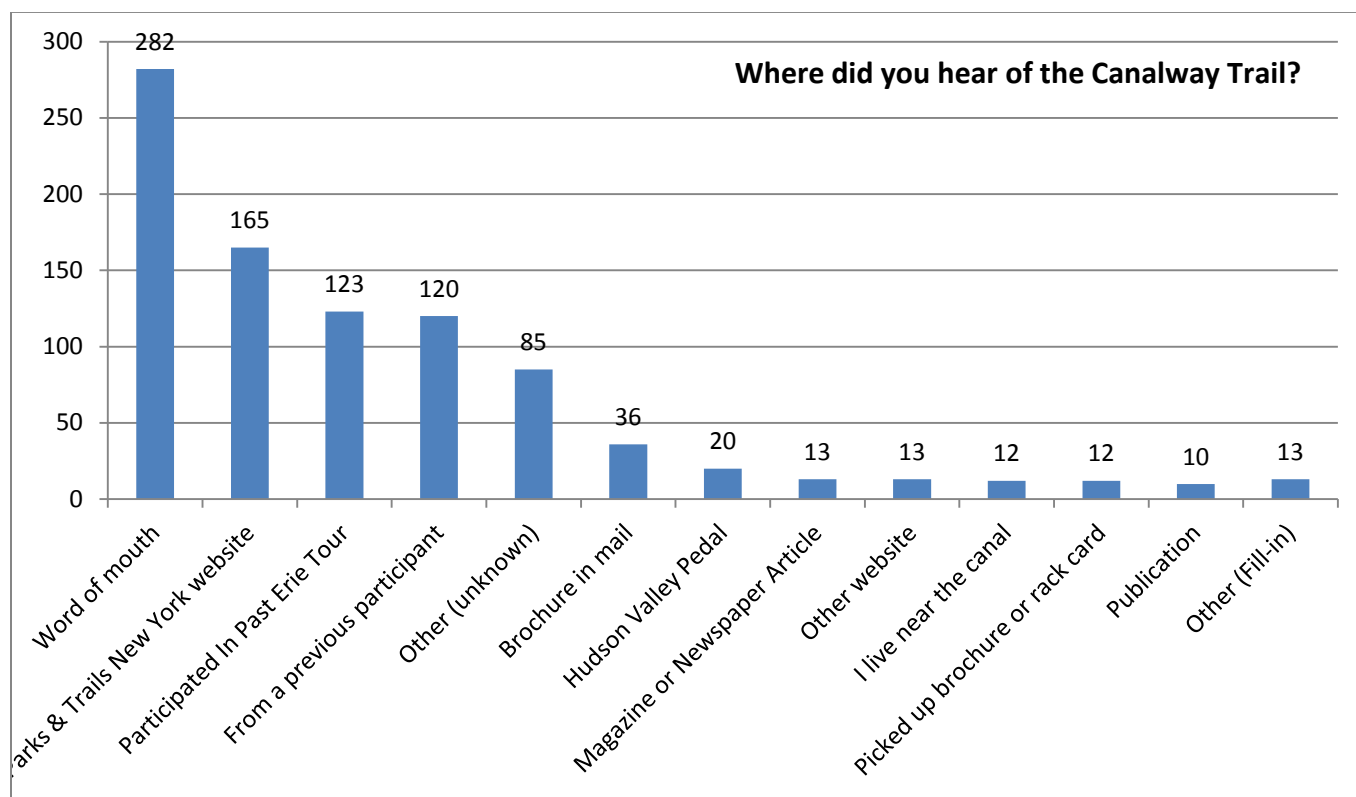
### Current work status

This question was added to the WuFoo form after we used it for the Erie Canalway Trail economic impact survey. It does not appear on the PDF form, thus there are no responses.

### How did you first hear about the Erie Canalway Trail or Cycling the Erie Canal Bike Tour?

“Word of mouth” and “From a previous participant” accounted for 43.2% of respondents hearing about the Canalway Trail. It is surprising that so many of the CTEC participants heard about the ride and/or the trail not from any formal promotion activities but through the most effective and least expensive form of advertising.

We ask this question on the CTEC registration form and the End-to-End survey. Registrants can only pick one answer. 905 applicants answered this question.

***What mode did you utilize to complete your journey?***

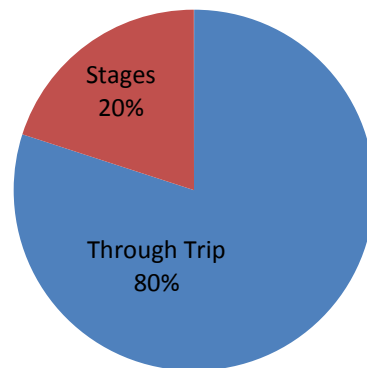
All applicants to date report having completed the journey on bicycle.

***Did you complete your journey as a through trip or in stages?***

Most of our applicants, 909 (98%), completed the Canalway Trail in a “through trip.” All of the CTEC riders complete the trail in eight days.

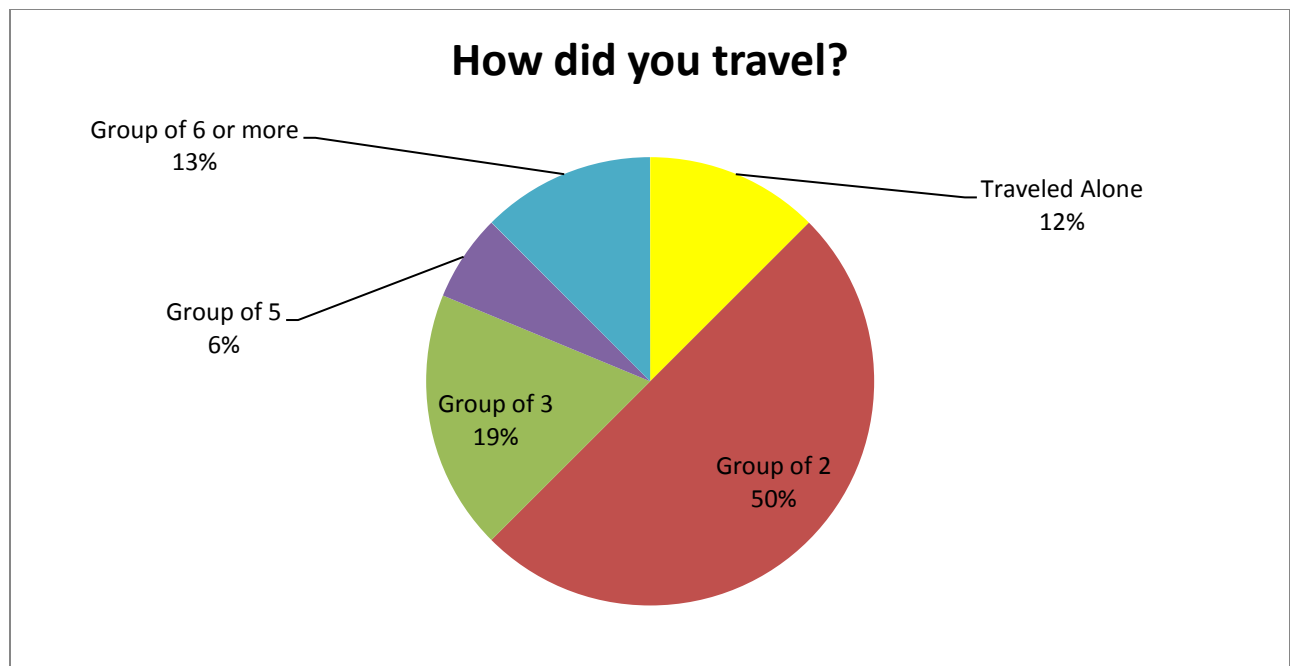
Of the 16 applicants that reported completing the trail on their own, not as part of CTEC, 15 answered this question. Most completed the bike trip as one through trip.

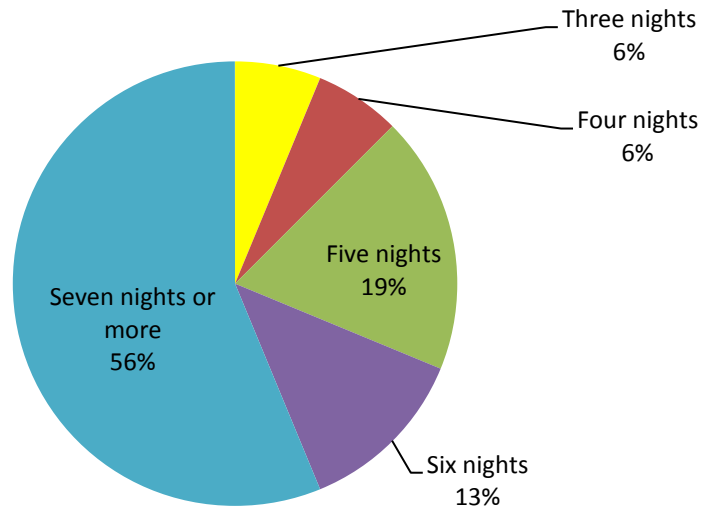
This question was added to the WuFoo form after we used it for the Erie Canalway Trail economic impact survey. It does not appear on the PDF form, thus there are no responses.

***How many nights did you stay along/near the trail on your tour?***

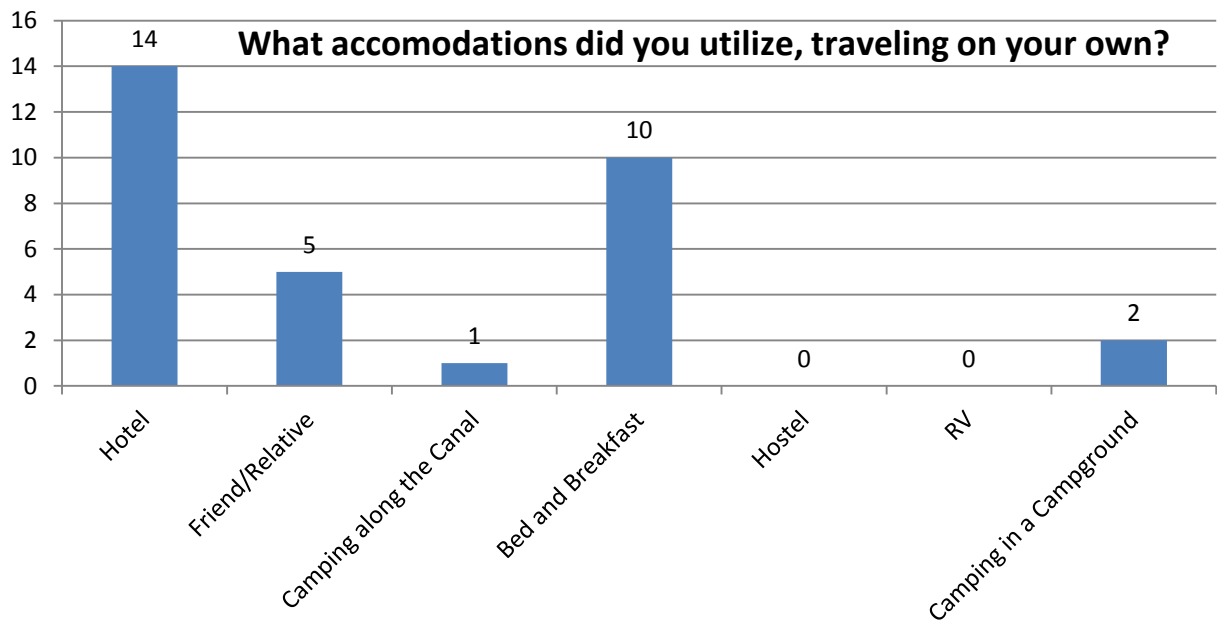
Our annual *Cycling the Erie Canal* bicycle tour starts on a Saturday with registration, a reception, and an orientation. Nearly all of our riders, with a rare exception, complete CTEC during the course of the standard eight nights of the tour.

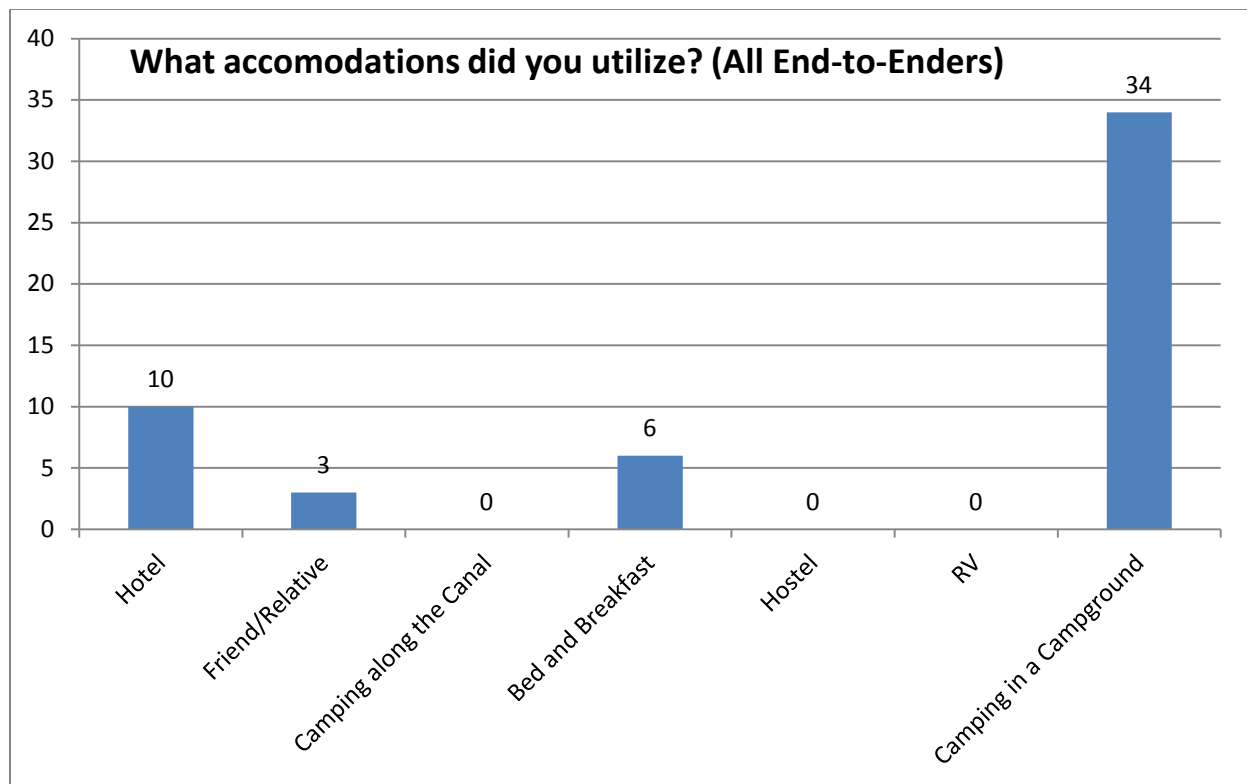
Of the non-CTEC applicants that filled out our PDF registration form and answered the question about staying overnight, most report staying seven or more nights.

***"If you stayed overnight, what accommodations did you utilize? (Check all that apply)."***



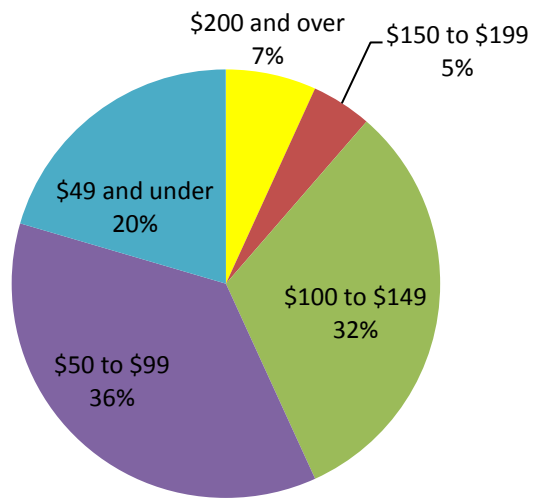


***Approximately how much did you spend in total (lodging, food, souvenirs, museums, transportation, etc.) per day?***

Forty-three PDF applicants answered this question. The question is not available on the CTEC registration form which applicants fill out before the tour.



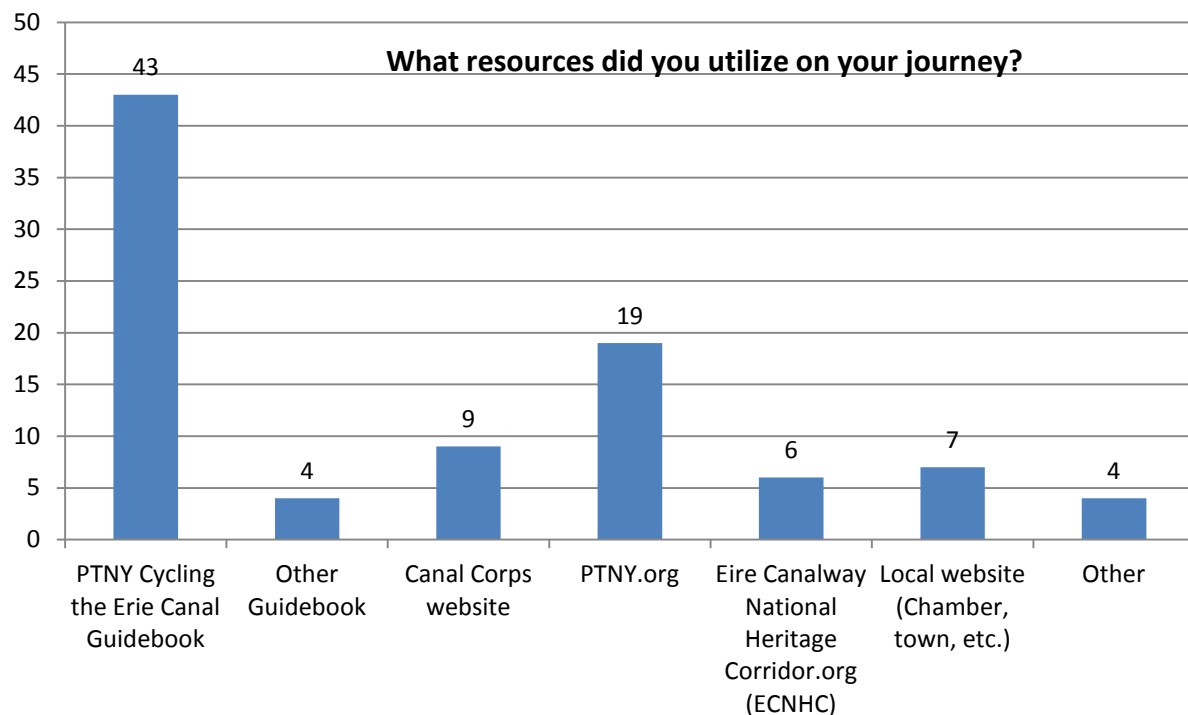
## Approximately how much did you spend per day?



Per day spending by each End-to-End ranges from a low of \$10.00 to a high of \$225. The average per day expenditure of those reporting is \$90.20. Most applicants spent between \$50 and \$99 per day. Over half, 68%, spend between \$50 and \$149 per day.

Of those that reported their daily spending, the average nights per stay were 6.74. Rudimentary calculation of the nights per trip multiplied by spending per day works out to an average of \$608 spent per person, per week on a typical End-to-End trip.

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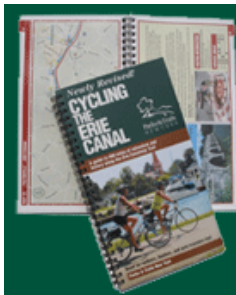

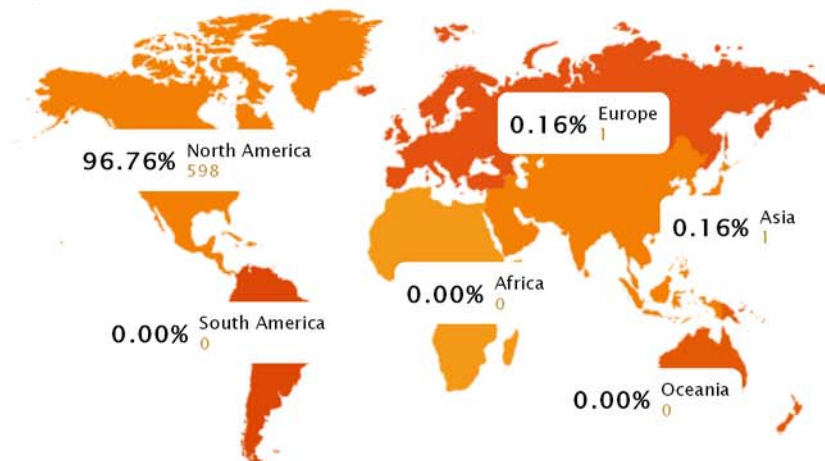

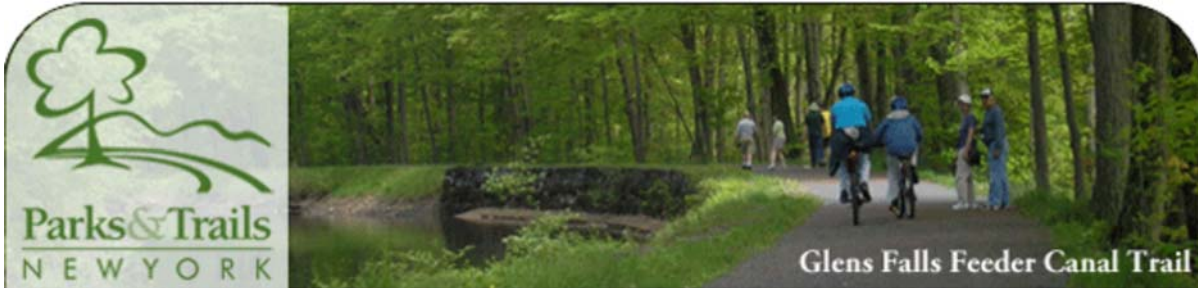

## It's serious: elimination of funding for biking and walking looms

## TrailFinder Trail of the Month

**Zim Smith Trail - now a National Recreation Trail**



Designated as a National Recreation Trail on National Trails Day, the Zim Smith Trail is a nine-mile multi-use trail stretching from Ballston Spa to the Town of Halfmoon in Saratoga County.

Most of the trail is paved but south of the Village of Round Lake it changes to a stone dust surface. Southern portions of the trail pass through wetlands, making it a great place for bird watching.



## Economic impact of Erie Canalway Trail focus of study

PTNY has launched the first-ever study of the current and potential economic impacts of the Erie Canalway Trail on New York's economy. Results will be presented not only in terms of dollars generated but also number of jobs created and sustained. Paul Scipione, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus of Business and Director of the Survey/Research Center at SUNY Geneseo, will conduct the eight-month effort.

Dr. Scipione and his team will survey 600-800 current trail users to gather data on demographics, trail usage, and spending patterns, and overall trail experience. Approximately 30 SUNY Geneseo undergraduates who live within the Canalway Trail corridor will administer the survey to persons selected randomly at multiple points along the trail. In addition, students will be noting the number and nature of trail users as part of an expansion of the annual Erie Canalway Trail count will survey local business owners and government, economic development and tourism officials.

The study is funded in part by the NYS Canal Corporation and the Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor. Study results will be available in early 2013.

## Senator Gillibrand urges Amtrak to allow roll-on bikes along Erie Canalway Trail

In a recent [press release](#), Senator Kirsten Gillibrand urged Amtrak to consider the appeal of New York State to bicyclists as it modernizes its service between New York and Buffalo. Currently, bicycles are prohibited on Amtrak trains unless they are disassembled and boxed. Stating that the inclusion of bicycle racks was a "commonsense step to remove barriers" between New Yorkers and the State's natural beauty, the Senator underscored the potential of bicycle tourism to "jumpstart a new economic engine" in communities along the Erie Canalway Trail.

Robin Dropkin, PTNY Executive Director, applauded the Senator's efforts, stating that these steps would not only bring more tourism dollars to canal communities, but would also provide Amtrak with increased ridership.

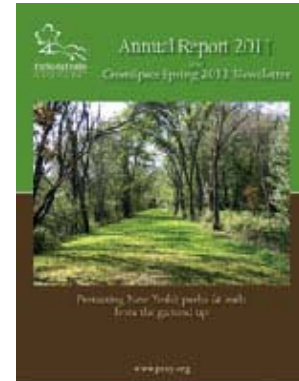
### Genesee Valley Greenway bridge dedicated

In Livingston County, the [Friends of the Genesee Valley Greenway](#) held a ribbon cutting to celebrate the opening of a 456-foot trail bridge linking the Town of Leicester with the Village of Mt. Morris. Acting NYSDOT Regional Director Robert Traver called the \$1.7M bridge crossing the Genesee River "a beautiful example of sustainable transportation that is improving our transportation system and bringing jobs to communities across the state."

## PTNY leads fight for state's bike-ped funding

PTNY is continuing its efforts to ensure that NYS directs the full measure of its federal MAP-21 Transportation Alternatives (TA) funding to trails, bike paths, complete streets, safe routes to school, and other bicycling and pedestrian infrastructure that supports active transportation. Recent advocacy efforts include:

- In a [press release](#) distributed statewide on October 1, PTNY, in conjunction with the [New York Bicycling Coalition](#) and [Tri-State Transportation Campaign](#), reminded New Yorkers that the new federal transportation law will mean a decrease in overall funding for bike/ped accommodations by 30% and give the state the authority to transfer up to half of these remaining TA funds (approximately \$12 million) to highways and bridges.
- During a recent meeting with key NYSDOT officials, PTNY learned that it may be 18 months before guidelines are finalized for administering a statewide competitive program for awarding TA funds for trails and bicycle and pedestrian projects.
- At the same meeting, PTNY emphasized the need for public input to the development of guidelines for the new TA funding program and urged NYSDOT to reconstitute the statewide bicycle-pedestrian advisory committee as a means to gather input and disseminate information.

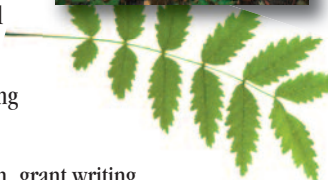
### Working with communities to build trails close to home

Three trail projects have been selected to receive assistance from PTNY as part of its *Healthy Trails, Healthy People* program, which is funded in part from the Healthy Heart Program of the NYS Department of Health. The projects are:

- **Genesee Valley Greenway, Allegany County** — to encourage usage and volunteer support for a newly completed one-mile section of Genesee Valley Greenway in the Village of Cuba.
- **Montezuma Heritage Park Erie Canal Towpath Trail, Cayuga County** — to help the Town of Montezuma create and promote a network of trails linking the hamlet with the Seneca River and several historic Erie Canal sites.
- **Andes Trails, Delaware County** — to create a five-mile trail linking the Village of Andes to the Pepacton Reservoir.

PTNY staff provides help with technical issues, planning, public outreach, grant writing, fundraising, programming and organizational development to these communities.

More than 39 communities have benefitted from PTNY's assistance through its *Healthy Trails, Healthy People* program. When all the trail projects are completed, almost 270 miles of new multi-use trail will be open to the public.



### Bringing together Park and Historic Site Friends around the state

PTNY staff members met with more than 125 park and historic site enthusiasts, representing 34 Friends groups, at three meetings held across the state in October. The meetings were held at some of our state park system's gems: Planting Fields Arboretum State Historic Park on Long Island, the Taconic Regional Headquarters in Staatsburg (a LEED Platinum-certified building), and Letchworth State Park in the Genesee Valley.

The gatherings — organized by PTNY and the Alliance for NYS Parks, in cooperation with State Parks and the State Council on Parks — were an opportunity for park enthusiasts to share information about working more collaboratively to protect and promote our park system.

More than 1000 volunteers turned out across the 524-mile Canal System to participate in 85 clean up events as part of the seventh annual "Canal Clean Sweep," held to celebrate Earth Day and prepare for the May first opening of the canal's 188<sup>th</sup> consecutive navigation season.

# 14th Annual Erie Canal bike tour set for July

The 14th annual cross-state bicycle tour along the Erie Canal – *Cycling the Erie Canal* – is scheduled for July 8-15, 2012. *Cycling the Erie Canal* is an eight-day, 400-mile recreational bicycle tour from Buffalo to Albany along the legendary Erie Canal.

*Cycling the Erie Canal* riders will enjoy fine scenery and fascinating history. The Erie Canal corridor is designated a National Heritage Corridor, one of only 49 across the nation. The bicycle tour passes through historic canal villages and rural countryside. Along the way, canal historians and local experts will introduce participants to the people, places and things that make the Erie Canal so unique and so important to the history of New York State and the country. About three-quarters of the ride is off-road, on the traffic-free Canalway Trail; the rest is on rural roads with good shoulders.

Canal Corporation Director, Brian U. Stratton, is assembling a team of Cabinet members from New York Governor Andrew Cuomo's administration to join the 500 riders from 36 states and five countries participating in the tour this year. About one-third of the registered riders are from New York State.

"New Yorkers are always as amazed as out-of-staters at the beauty of the Erie Canal corridor as well as its cultural and historic richness," says Robin Dropkin, Executive Director of Parks & Trails New York.

The NYS Canal Corporation is the Premier State Sponsor of the event for the 14th straight year. First Niagara Financial Group is the official bank sponsor and the Erie Canalway National

## Close the Gaps Campaign

### Second annual progress report released

The Canalway Trails Association New York (CTANY), in collaboration with Parks & Trails New York (PTNY), has released its second annual *Closing the Gaps: A Progress Report on the Erie Canalway Trail 2011*. The report summarizes the status of efforts to complete the trail and outlines the efforts that CTANY and PTNY intend to undertake during 2012.

With 270 miles now open to the public, the 365-mile Erie Canalway Trail is 75% complete and on its way to becoming a premiere tourist destination for cyclists and other outdoor enthusiasts. However, the Erie Canalway Trail can neither realize its full potential as a world-class tourism destination nor offer maximum benefit to the more than 200 communities along its length until it is finished from Buffalo to Albany as a continuous off-road trail.

Although no new trail was built in 2011, significant progress was made in efforts to close the remaining trail gaps.

#### Dramatic increase in state, local and regional support

Interest in completing the Erie Canalway Trail among citizens, community leaders, and elected officials at all levels of local, state and federal government was at an all-time high. The campaign to "Close the Gaps," initiated by Senator Kirsten Gillibrand in the fall of 2010 with a roundtable in Canajoharie, drew more than 200 persons to additional roundtables in 2011 in Syracuse, Lockport, Utica, and

Clyde. Each roundtable has spawned local follow up meetings and a number of working groups focused on discovering "out of the box" solutions to the unique challenges associated with discrete segments within the larger trail gaps.

#### Progress on identifying a route through Syracuse

The Syracuse Metropolitan Transportation Council (SMTTC) agreed to complete the Erie Canalway Trail - Syracuse Connector Route project to explore options for a safe and well-marked 12-mile route for the trail between Camillus and Dewitt through the City of Syracuse. The project will be completed by SMTTC staff on behalf of the City, with input from SMTTC member agencies, other stakeholders, and the general public. SMTTC has allocated \$30,000 toward this effort. Presently, cyclists must negotiate heavily travelled, unmarked urban streets.

#### Two "Close the Gaps" efforts receive NYS Canal Corporation grants

The City of Rome received a \$50,000 Canal Corporation grant to construct an additional two miles of on- and off-road trail between Old Erie Canal State Park and the Muck Road parking area.

Completion of this trail section along with the two-mile section already under development within the City will result in more than 50 miles of continuous trail from Dewitt to Utica.

Schenectady County was awarded \$140,000 toward construction of 1.3 miles of trail as part of a major private-public waterfront development at the site of the former American Locomotive Company in the City of Schenectady. When complete, almost all the trail will be off-road within the city limits.

#### Focus for 2012

In the coming year, CTANY and PTNY will continue to seek the support of Senator Gillibrand's office for completing the five major trail gaps, work with Canalway Trail communities and all levels of government to assist their efforts to close the gaps, and communicate the importance of the Canalway Trail to supporting tourism and local economies and improving the health and the quality of life of Canalway Trail community residents.

Although rocksand is a cheap way to maintain the trail, it was difficult to ride on, especially for many hours. I would recommend investing in serious pavement along the trail.

BETTER SIGNAGE! Especially in urban areas, and in the eastern half in general. Also, better integration of signage directions with the suburban/urban trail network in Buffalo area--very hard to find the "official" westernmost trailhead.
Signage and trail completeness and condition are very important to attracting cyclists to the region for vacations. Maintenance of paved sections of both the Canalway trail and the adjoining trails is also critical. Tree-root bumps on paved paths are a major detractor, such as traveling into Rochester. Also, shade trees enable use of the trail in all weather - they are lacking in many (esp. Western) sections.
For the most part the trail conditions were great. I remember there was one very difficult place to cross a major roadway near Rochester-many lanes of traffic. There was also a confusing place before we got top a rest stop in a park in Rochester-trail signage there did seem adequate. But these are minor details on a trail that is just fantastic.
Signage in some places, though few, could have been clearer. Soft surface trail areas were a minor safety concern.
Keep working on closing the gaps in the Canalway trail.
Sometimes the signage was missing and got lost.

Some sections of the trail, like outside of Little Falls, have had too much gravel installed which makes cycling difficult.
We were very pleased with the guidebook and road markings. The only problems were a couple of wrong turns when we unintentionally took alternate routes.
Better signs, require flashing lights on all cycles or provide a large reflecting sign that would attach to the rear of backpacks.
Always make sure the surface of the trail is packed hard and wide enough to allow for easy riding.
Beautiful trail from Lockport East 90 miles. Syracuse area is in great need of help. Using Erie Boulevard is a bad idea. Dangerous, crowded. Eastern end from Little Falls onward is also wonderful. I recommend using Onondaga Lake Park instead of city streets for trail with perhaps a spur off to the Canal Museum in Syracuse.

(Although the marks sometimes seemed to conflict with the guide route or with each other.) I will return and recommend strongly to others, especially if the trail continues to improve and if progress is made toward completing it and connecting to other trails. I look for networks that enable long-distance off-highway bike travel. (I have cycled the Great Allegheny Passage and Missouri's Katy Trail, and I am eager to continue). Historical, geographical, geological, cultural, architectural exhibits, markers and guides are helpful, and tourist-friendly communities are appreciated. Lodging options (including primitive camping and hotels) along the route were good - even more at regular intervals would be helpful. I would have liked to buy a souvenir, such as cycling apparel, hats, decals, etc if I had found any.
